


In 2018, CPAL was created with the goal of cutting child poverty in half within a single generation.

A strong relationship exists between 3rd Grade Reading success & Middle of Year Moves



36% of 3rd graders

state reading exam




Only 23% of 3rd graders who did move mid year, achieved a passing score or higher on their state reading exam

Commit & BCG performed a statistical regression analysis using student - level data from Dallas ISD


The analysis highlighted Middle of Year Moves as a major barrier to ongoing efforts to improve 3rd grade reading scores
















"Within cities, gun violence is concentrated in a small set of disinvested neighborhoods, and within these neighborhoods, such violence is even more concentrated within a small set of "microgeographic places," like particular streets. This is a well-established trend that holds in every city or non-urban setting in which it has been studied.

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
• We used a grid to split Dallas into 110,000+ cells








- We used a grid to split Dallas into 110.000+ cells
- From that grid, we asked how many cells meet both of the following two criteria:
 - At least 1 homicide has occurred within the cell over the past five years
 - At least 3 incidents of gun violence have occurred within the past year






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


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
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






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- We then added a .25 mi border around each of the 40 cells
- Over the past 5 years, the cells with borders account for: 24.9% of all homicides

Violent crime is down in Dallas, and here's why

In the Malcolm X and Marburg area of South Dallas, the city installed the first set of lights meant to enhance public safety, stepped up code enforcement work, engaged multifamily properties, cleaned up abandoned lots and supported mutual aid efforts of community residents... **violent crime in that area fell 23%**, outpacing the 18% reduction across the entire southeast patrol division and also **outperforming the 9% citywide violent crime decrease**.

And to be clear, Dallas didn't arrest its way out of violent crime in either location, which might be the most remarkable aspect of this approach. In 2019, police made 170 arrests in the Malcolm X and Marburg focus area. In 2021, police made only 69 arrests in that area.

Abstract

Largely overlooked in the theoretical and empirical literature on the crime decline is a long tradition of research in criminology and urban sociology that considers how violence is regulated through informal sources of social control arising from residents and organizations internal to communities. In this article, we incorporate the "systemic" model of community life into debates on the U.S. crime drop, and we focus on the role that local nonprofit organizations played in the national decline of violence from the 1990s to the 2010s. Using longitudinal data and a strategy to account for the endogeneity of nonprofit formation, we estimate the causal effect on violent crime of nonprofits focused on reducing violence and building stronger communities. Drawing on a panel of 264 cities spanning more than 20 years, we estimate that every 10 additional organizations focusing on crime and community life in a city with 100,000 residents leads to a 9 percent reduction in the murder rate, a 6 percent reduction in the property crime rate.
