










Schools in our historically underserved groups represent the largest share of our performance.





Our students who don't belong to an accountability group perform 3x better than their subgroup peers on state assessments in terms of proficiency rates.

The performance gaps persist even across schools with very different demographic make-up.

Students not in one of our historically underperforming subgroups are proficient at higher rates in both high and low performing schools. The difference falls largely in the percentage of subgroup makeup across these schools.





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
Coordination Of Services Team (COST)
