By listing community assets ahead of Summer Institute, you will come ready to engage in planning



Before summer institute

- Use data to consider potential neighborhoods within your district to target
- List and begin identifying existing assets in relevant neighborhoods, including:
 - Potential backbone organizations and systems level partners
 - Cradle-to-career service delivery organizations (e.g., early childhood education facilities, K-12 schools)

At summer institute

- Pressure test neighborhood selection and asset map
- Consider how to access funders and leverage existing investments
- Begin to formalize partnership plans with potential backbone organizations, or define next steps to engage a backbone partner
- Build out the longer list of potential service delivery organizations within target neighborhoods with a focus on evidence-based interventions
- **Assess key gaps** across the cradle-tocareer continuum and make concrete plans to address them

In the ideal state, a backbone serves as the anchor for the place-based partnership



Responsibilities of a strong backbone

- 1. Works with systems leaders to set the strategy, vision, and aspiration for the partnership
- 2. Convenes key stakeholders and partners and aligns them to a central vision
- 3. Holds accountability for the whole cradle-to-career strategy, including student level outcomes and success of service delivery partners' programming
- 4. Centralizes and standardizes data infrastructure, allowing them to collect and analyze data across all service delivery partners and set accountability for the program
- 5. Engages in some level of service delivery which gives them a direct connection to the populations the program serves (e.g., running their own programming)
- 6. Provides young people and families with one-on-one support and connections to service delivery programs through family achievement coaches
- 7. Leads systems change work to catalyze career-to-cradle efforts on the ground
- 8. Has the capacity and ability to provide some level of technical assistance to partner organizations
- 9. Has relationships across the community and understands the community's vision
- 10. Has **relationships with systems leaders** in the community, such as the school board, who can assist the backbone
- 11. Has the **capacity to lead fundraising** for partner organizations (including finding and applying for government grants) and **ability to allocate funding effectively** to best support the program
- 12. Has a close relationship with neighborhood schools or with the broader school system in an area
