

Race, place, and income should no longer be determinants of school and life outcomes for children and youth


Declining intergenerational mobility

Rates of absolute mobility have declined sharply. 90% of children born in the 1940s earned more than their parents; this was true for only 50% of children born in the 1980s.¹



Inequitable opportunity

Children's outcomes in adulthood are determined more by their socioeconomic status, zip code, and race than by the quality of their schools. Students from the lowest income families may be up to six grade levels behind their peers from the highest income families.²

Ed Reform: Necessary but Insufficient

Schools alone, as currently constituted, cannot do the job of *all means all*.



Ed reform set out to achieve *all means all*. But there is still an **iron law correlation** between socioeconomic status and educational achievement and attainment. We are building a movement to transform the systems that are currently failing to provide equitable access to supports, resources, and opportunities to all children and youth...

There are gaps in today's child development and education systems





Supports and resources for children and families are fragmented, hard to access, and not available to *all*



School systems often fail to meet student needs by operating a "one size fits all" model


Movement Building/Systems Change




