Julie Allen, Director of Strategy and Communications, The EdRedesign Lab, Harvard Graduate School of Education



Julie Allen is director of strategy and communications at EdRedesign where she focuses on strategy, communications, and development. Most recently, Julie was senior advisor at EdRedesign from January 2022 to February 2023. Previously, Julie was a Harvard Advanced Leadership Initiative 2020 fellow and 2021 senior fellow. Prior to her fellowship, she had a distinguished career in corporate law, focusing on capital markets, public company M&A transactions, and boardroom governance and counsel. Most recently, she was a senior partner at Proskauer Rose, where,

in addition to her practice, her management roles included practice group leadership, new business intake, and risk management. She served as senior editor-education for the Harvard ALI Social Impact Review from 2021 through 2023. In addition, Julie is a member of the board of directors of Read Ahead (which she chaired from 2019 through 2023), a reading-based mentoring organization serving NYC public elementary school children, for which she has served as a volunteer reading mentor for over a decade. Julie is also a member of the board of The Trevor Project, the largest suicide prevention and mental health organization serving LGBTQ+ youth in the U.S. and Mexico. She also served as a member of the advisory board of the Harvard Kennedy School Carr Center for Human Rights Policy from 2021 through 2023.

Denisse Arias, Director of the Fellowship for Cradle-to-Career Partnership Leaders, The EdRedesign Lab, Harvard Graduate School of Education



Denisse Arias brings experience in equity-focused leadership development, cross-sector collaboration, education systems transformation, and monitoring, evaluation, and learning within education and international development. Prior to joining EdRedesign, Denisse held various roles at Teach For All, supporting leaders across Asia, Latin America, Africa, and Europe pursuing systems change and collective leadership efforts, most recently as the Director for Leadership Development & Equity. During her time at Teach For All, Denisse also co-led a 17-person team responsible for

designing and executing over 50 learning experiences, Fellowships, and communities of practice for network stakeholders. She also supported partnerships with USAID, the European Commission, and the World Bank. Denisse co-led the Leading from Lived Experience Fellowship from 2019-2024, a leadership development opportunity for network members who themselves had experienced inequities within their contexts, that reached over 100 network members. A Teach For America Alum, Denisse taught in her community and served as inaugural Co-Board Chair for the Teach For America – Massachusetts' Homegrown Alumni Board, supporting engagement with corps members and alumni from Massachusetts. In June 2024, Denisse was selected as a Hispanics in Philanthropy Lideres Fellow. Denisse serves as a board member for Shout Mouse Press, an organization that supports youth in the D.C., Maryland, and Virginia (DMV) area dedicated to centering and amplifying the voices of marginalized youth through writing workshops, book publication, and public speaking opportunities. She holds a B.A and B.S. from Boston University and a Master's in Public Administration (MPA) from Columbia University's School of International & Public Affairs.

Dr. Cornell Brooks, Hauser Professor of the Practice of Nonprofit Organizations, Professor of the Practice of Nonprofit Organizations, and Professor of the Practice of Public Leadership and Social Justice at the Harvard Kennedy School



Cornell William Brooks is Hauser Professor of the Practice of Nonprofit Organizations and Professor of the Practice of Public Leadership and Social Justice at the Harvard Kennedy School. He is the Director of The William Monroe Trotter Collaborative for Social Justice at the School's Center for Public Leadership. Professor Brooks served as the 18th president and CEO of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People from 2014 to 2017. Under his leadership, the NAACP secured 12 significant legal victories, including laying the groundwork for the first statewide legal challenge to prison-based gerrymandering. He is also a civil rights attorney, and a fourth-generation ordained minister in

the African Methodist Episcopal Church. Prior to leading the NAACP, Brooks was president and CEO of the New Jersey Institute for Social Justice. Additionally, he served as senior counsel and acting director of the Office of Communications Business Opportunities at the Federal Communications Commission, executive director of the Fair Housing Council of Greater Washington, and a trial attorney at both the Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law and the U.S. Department of Justice. Professor Brooks holds a J.D. from Yale Law School, a Master of Divinity Degree from Boston University's School of Theology, and a B.A. from Jackson State University.

Dr. Shanda Crowder has 20 years of experience in strategic planning as well as developing and implementing educational programs for youth and families. Before joining PRI, she was a senior associate within the leadership development unit at the Annie E. Casey Foundation. She co-led the development and launch of the MBK Framework to Affect Systems Change, a foundational standard of excellence outlining a set of

principles, indicators, and processes to accelerate progress on complex social conditions for boys and young men of color. By 2018, she certified and onboarded 180 cities, towns, and tribal nations across the country as part of the MBK Network. She also orchestrated a 50-member team in planning and executing MBK Rising!. Prior to this, Cecilia spent five years as President and CEO of the Miami Children's Initiative, a place-based cradle to career strategy in the community of Liberty City in Miami, FL. This includes proactive and responsive network supports, impact investment and a comprehensive network member experience. Bridget leads a team focused on building and disseminating knowledge critical for place-based partnership success and provides thought leadership to the field of place-based partnerships. Most recently, Bridget served as chief of staff, helping to develop and implement StriveTogether's strategy and accelerate the vision of its

president and CEO. Since joining StriveTogether in 2013, Bridget has played a key role in establishing the StriveTogether Theory of Action and national Cradle to Career Network. In her various roles, including senior director of network advancement and associate director of network quality, she oversaw a national evaluation that validated the Theory of Action, oversaw the strategy for "network effect" offerings and built membership standards. He supports leaders of cradle-to-career systems and communities across the U.S. Gustavo is an award-wining educator, entrepreneur, and leader. He is renowned for his creativity, fostering connections, and unwavering commitment to uplift communities. His work has focused on enrichment programs and leadership development. At the age of 23, Gustavo launched his first education organization, rapidly expanding it, employing 120 educators, and serving thousands of students across 50 school

The organization provides after-school and day-time intervention services for school districts across California. His project, *EDGE*, provides individualized academic coaching to support fostered youth earn high school diplomas.

Kimberlyn Leary, Ph.D., MPA is a senior fellow at the Bloomberg Center for Cities at Harvard University, an associate professor of psychology at the Harvard Medical School, and an associate professor in the Department of Health Policy and Management at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. She served as an adviser to the Obama White House from 2014–2016, working with the White House Council on Women and Girls to develop the Advancing Equity initiative, which focused on improving life outcomes for women and girls of color. Most recently, she served as a senior policy advisor in the Biden White House to the Domestic Policy Council and as a senior equity

Nonie K. Lesaux, Interim Dean, Roy E. Larsen Professor of Education and Human Development, Harvard Graduate School of Education



Nonie K. Lesaux is the Roy E. Larsen Professor of Education and Human Development at the Harvard Graduate School of Education (HGSE). She leads a research program on strategies and innovations to improve learning opportunities and literacy outcomes for children and youth. Her teaching focuses on literacy development and reform, early learning, and leading system-level change. Lesaux's research-practice partnerships with large urban school districts, to improve literacy rates, include seven years with San Diego Unified and ten years with the New York City Department of Education. With Stephanie Jones, Lesaux leads the <u>Saul Zaentz Early Education Initiative</u> at HGSE, which

addresses the pervasive global challenge of simultaneously scaling and improving the quality of early education. Lesaux's research appears in numerous scholarly publications, and its practical applications are featured in several books for school leaders and educators. She is co-editor of the Handbook of Reading Research (2022) and wrote a widely circulated state literacy report, Turning the Page: Refocusing Massachusetts for Reading Success, that inspired a third-grade reading proficiency bill passed in Massachusetts. Lesaux has earned the William T. Grant Scholars Award and the Presidential Early Career Award for Scientists and Engineers, the highest honor given by the U.S. government to young professionals beginning their independent research careers. Lesaux is a member of the National Academy of Education and the board of the Spencer Foundation.

Ben Lewis, Vice President of Learning & Innovation, Purpose Built Communities



Ben Lewis is the Vice President of Learning and Innovation at Purpose Built Communities. Within this role, he leads the Purpose Built Communities Solutions Lab, coordinates organizational learning, and drives field building efforts. Prior to joining Purpose Built, Ben studied leadership and comprehensive community development at Harvard University. Before that, he led a high school at Strive Preparatory Schools in Denver, CO, elevating the school by two tiers on the Colorado state assessment. He also served as an assistant principal at KIPP and Northeast High School in Philadelphia, where he launched a writing program, coordinated testing, and led a school culture plan that increased on-time student attendance by 60%. Ben began his career as a high school humanities teacher at Freire Charter School, where he

achieved a 92% yearly college acceptance rate as the senior team lead, authored a social sciences curriculum, and coached the varsity track and field team. Ben's accolades include the Penn Club of Philadelphia Social Impact Award, Philadelphia regional representative for the Sue Lehmann Award for Teaching Excellence, Harvard Graduate School of Education Entrepreneurship Award, and The Harvard Krinsky Entrepreneurship and Innovation Award. He also actively participates in advisory boards like Partners in Democracy and is an Aspen Pahara Fellow. Ben earned his doctorate in educational leadership from Harvard University. He also holds a Master of Science in Education and a Bachelor of Arts in Urban Studies and Africana Studies, both degrees from the University of Pennsylvania.

work covered a broad span of topics in education and economic policy. Rosa Inés Méndez is a first-generation Black Dominican American born and raised in Chicago. She attended the University of Illinois at Chicago, earning a Bachelor of Psychology with a minor in Spanish. She received her master's degree in mental health counseling from Roosevelt University in 2004. Rosa has over 20 years of experience with community engagement and mental health services. She has served as a case manager, program manager, Community Schools Resource Coordinator and Early Childhood Resource Specialist. In these positions she was able

to bear witness to the racial inequities across multiple systems. She has worked with non-profit organizations, school districts and businesses during her career to promote equitable and just community, parent and family engagement efforts in the Chicagoland area. She is a Seeking Educational Equity & Diversity (SEED) facilitator and has experience-creating mutual aid efforts in Evanston, III. She is the board chair for the Village Legal and Community Project serving the South Shore, Woodlawn, and Englewood communities of Chicago. Her purpose is grounded in social and equity justice, empowering individuals and families, and connecting people to resources within their community.

Richard Raya, CEO, Marin Promise Partnership; By All Means Senior Fellow, The EdRedesign Lab



In his current role as CEO of the Marin Promise Partnership, **Richard Raya** brings deep collaboration and systems-change expertise to the problem of poverty and the challenge of advancing educational equity in Marin County. The Partnership is a cradle-to-career network to advance educational equity across Marin by strengthening the county's system of schools and educational support services. In his previous role as Senior Advisor at the Mission Economic Development Agency (MEDA), Richard used Mission Promise Neighborhood's cradleto-career, collaborative approach to help drive systems change across the city of San Francisco, moving from Promise Neighborhood to Promise City. Promise City aligns the best practices from Mission Promise Neighborhood with the Mayor's COVID recovery plan, creating holistic, cradle-to-career solutions in the city's hardest hit neighborhoods.

Richard is also a Board Member for the San Francisco Bay Area Planning and Urban Research Association (SPUR), co-chair of the African American Latino Action Alliance, and a member of the Executive Committee for End Child Poverty in California. Prior to this, Richard was the Chief of Staff for an Oakland City Council member, and the Director of Administration for the Alameda County Public Health Department. Richard's great-grandparents were indigenous Yaquis who came to the Bay Area after fighting in the Mexican Revolution. His parents worked as farmworkers in Northern California and came of age during the Chicano Movement. They laid the foundation for him to earn a B.A. and Master's in Public Policy from UC Berkeley. He's accompanied on this journey by his urban planner wife, five sons, and their rescue pit bull.

Paul Reville, Founder and Faculty Director, The EdRedesign Lab; Francis Keppel Professor of Practice of Educational Policy and Administration at the Harvard Graduate School of Education



Professor Paul Reville returned to the Harvard Graduate School of Education as the Francis Keppel Professor of Practice of Educational Policy and Administration in 2013, having just completed nearly five years of service as the secretary of education for the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. As Governor Deval Patrick's top education advisor, Reville established the Executive Office of Education and had oversight of higher education, K-12, and early education in the nation's leading student achievement state. He served in the Governor's Cabinet and played a leading education reform role on matters ranging from the Achievement

Gap Act of 2010 and Common Core State Standards to the Commonwealth's highly successful Race to the Top proposal.

He is particularly interested in matters of federal and state education policy and is now concentrating his work on the design of 21st-century learning systems, braiding schooling, health/social supports, and enrichments to close learning gaps.

Prior to joining the Patrick Administration, Reville had chaired the Massachusetts State Board of Education, founded the Rennie Center for Education Research and Policy, co-founded the Massachusetts Business Alliance for Education (MBAE), chaired the Massachusetts Reform Review Commission, and the Massachusetts Commission on Time and Learning, and served as Executive Director of the Pew Forum on Standards-Based Reform, a national think tank which convened the U.S.'s leading researchers, practitioners, and policymakers to set the national standards agenda. Reville played a central role in MBAE's development of and advocacy for Massachusetts' historic Education Reform Act of 1993. Reville has been a member of the HGSE faculty since 1997 and has served as Director of the Education Policy and Management Program.

Reville's career, which combines research, policy, and practice, began with service as a VISTA volunteer and youth worker. He served as a teacher and principal of two urban, alternative high schools. Some years later, he founded a local education foundation which was part of the Public Education Network. He is a board member and adviser to a host of organizations, and a frequent

writer and speaker on education reform and policy issues. He edited the book entitled, A Decade of Urban School Reform: Persistence and Progress in the Boston Public Schools. He holds five honorary doctorate degrees. Last and most importantly, he is the father of four children.

Lynne Sacks, Research Director, The EdRedesign Lab, Harvard Graduate School of Education
