Denisse Arias
Director, Cradle-to-Career Leadership & Learning,

EdRedesign, Harvard Graduate School of Education

Denisse Arias is the Director for Cradle-to-Career Leadership and Learning and oversees signature talent development programs and initiatives, including EdRedesign's inaugural Fellowship for Cradle-to-Career Partnership Leaders and By All Means Senior Fellows Program.

Denisse brings experience in equity-focused leadership development, cross-sector collaboration, education systems transformation, and monitoring, evaluation, and learning within education and international development. Prior to joining EdRedesign, Denisse held various roles at Teach For All, supporting leaders across all regions pursuing systems change and collective leadership efforts, most recently as the Director for Leadership Development & Equity. During her time at Teach For All, Denisse also co-led a 17-person team responsible for designing and executing over 50 learning experiences, Fellowships, and communities of practice for network stakeholders. She also supported multiple multilateral partnerships, with USAID, the European Commission, and the World Bank. Denisse co-launched the Leading from Lived Experience Fellowship from 2019-2024, a leadership development opportunity for network members who themselves had experienced inequities within their contexts.

A Teach For America Alum, Denisse taught in her community and served as the inaugural Co-Board Chair for the Teach For America – Massachusetts' Homegrown Alumni Board. In June 2024, Denisse was selected as a Hispanics in Philanthropy Lideres Fellow. Denisse serves as the co-Board Chair for Shout Mouse Press, a non-profit publishing organization that supports youth in the D.C., Maryland, and Virginia (DMV). She holds a B.A and B.S. from

Boston University and a Master's in Public Administration (MPA) from Columbia University's School of International & Public Affairs.

Russell Booker

Chief Executive Officer, Spartanburg Academic Movement; By All Means Senior Fellow, EdRedesign, Harvard Graduate School of Education

Russell Booker is the Chief Executive Officer of the Spartanburg Academic Movement in Spartanburg, South Carolina.

Russell is a devoted champion of education and community advancement, with over 30 years of leadership experience across the education and nonprofit sectors. His life's work centers on creating opportunity and empowering students for lives of leadership, purpose, and service. As Chief Executive Officer of the Spartanburg Academic Movement, he is spearheading Movement 2030, a bold, integrated economic mobility plan designed to help thousands of Spartanburg's children chart a path to upward mobility.

Following his retirement as Superintendent of Spartanburg County School District Seven, Russell continues to shape national and local systems of support for children and families. He currently chairs the StriveTogether Board of Directors and serves on the boards of Purpose Built Communities, Wingate University, the Mary Black Foundation, and the Spartanburg Regional Hospital Foundation. His impact has been widely recognized. Russell is a recipient of the Whitney M. Young, Jr. Humanitarian Award, was named South Carolina Superintendent of the Year, and has been inducted into the South Atlantic Conference Hall of Fame as a Distinguished Athlete Alumni. In 2020, he received South Carolina's highest civilian honor—the Order of the Palmetto. Most recently, he was named the 2023 Neville Holcombe Distinguished Citizen by OneSpartanburg, Inc.

A proud member of the Spartanburg Alumni Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc., and the South Carolina Liberty Fellowship, Russell is deeply engaged in his community. He earned his B.S. in Education from Wingate University and a Ph.D. in Educational Leadership from the University of South Carolina. In recognition of his contributions, he has also been awarded two honorary doctorate degrees. He served as a By All Means Senior Fellow at the EdRedesign Lab at Harvard University's Graduate School of Education in the 2023-2025 Cohort.

Russell and his wife, Sheryl, reside in Spartanburg and are the proud parents of two sons. Grant, a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, was commissioned as a U.S. Marine Corps officer in 2023, and Maxwell is a member of the Harvard College Class of 2026. The family worships at Mt. Moriah Baptist Church.



Brenda Lee Pryce

Founder of the Spartanburg Heritage Committee, South Carolina State House of Representatives (1995 -2005)

Brenda Lee Pryce is an author and civic leader whose work centers on preserving and amplifying the history of Spartanburg, South Carolina. She is co-author of *North of Main: Spartanburg's Historic Black Neighborhoods of North Dean Street, Gas Bottom, and Back of the College* (Hub City Press, 2024) and *South of Main*

(Hub City Press, 2005), landmark community histories documenting the rise, displacement, and enduring legacy of Black neighborhoods in Spartanburg. *North of Main* was released on October 22, 2024, and spans 250 pages with 150+ archival photographs and maps.

From 1995 to 2005, Pryce represented House District 31 in the South Carolina House of Representatives—the first Black woman from Spartanburg elected to the state legislature. During her tenure, she served on the Labor, Commerce and Industry Committee, helped secure funding for breast-cancer education for underserved women in the Upstate, and sponsored a resolution honoring Martin Luther King Jr. with a stretch of South Church Street designation.

A founding member and longtime leader within the Spartanburg African American Heritage & Culture Committee, Pryce has been central to recent heritage initiatives—including the Southside Cultural Monument project, which reached a public unveiling in 2025. She has also held roles with the Urban League of the Upstate, the Spartanburg Development Council, and Wofford College's President's Advisory Council. In recognition of her decades of public service and community history work, Wofford College awarded Pryce an Honorary Doctor of Humanities in 2023. A lifelong Southside resident, she graduated from Carver High School (1966) and attended the University of South Carolina.



Keisha Gray Chief Strategy Officer, Spartanburg Academic Movement

Keisha Gray is the Chief Strategy Officer at the Spartanburg Academic Movement, where she steers cross-sector strategy to advance SAM's cradle-to-career agenda across initiatives in early childhood, K-12, postsecondary, and community resilience. Her portfolio includes partnering with SAM's Centers (e.g., Early Childhood Success, Youth Engagement & Partnerships,

Postsecondary Success) to align programs, data, and community partnerships that boost educational attainment and economic mobility in Spartanburg County.

Before joining SAM, Keisha led human resources teams in professional sports and media—serving as Director of Human Resources for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and previously for the *Sarasota Herald-Tribune* Media Group. Earlier, she was Program Director for Early Childhood Development at the Mary Black Foundation, where she helped shape community investments and frameworks that advanced health equity and early learning.

A frequent collaborator across Spartanburg, Keisha is an active partner in countywide coalitions and has been featured speaking on SAM's work to expand family supports (Hello Family) and strengthen postsecondary pathways and workforce readiness.

Keisha holds a B.S. in Biology (minor in Psychology) from the University of South Carolina and a master's in Human Resource Development from Webster University. Her community leadership includes service with the Spartanburg Housing Authority, the Junior League of Spartanburg, and the Spartanburg Preparatory School board, among others.



Marquice Clark Principal, The Cleveland Academy of Leadership, Spartanburg School District 7

Marquice Clark is principal of The Cleveland Academy of Leadership, where he has led a multi-year turnaround since 2019—earning the school its first-ever "Excellent" rating on the South Carolina School Report Card (now back-to-back) and significantly boosting student outcomes. In 2024, he was named the 2025 South Carolina Elementary Principal of the Year by the

South Carolina Association of School Administrators, recognition that cited sharp gains in proficiency—ELA from 20% to 52%, math from 13% to 58%, and science from 7% to 55%—and reductions in discipline referrals under his leadership.

A former second-grade teacher and assistant principal at Cleveland, Marquice became principal after serving in those roles on the same campus, helping to build a culture of continuous improvement in partnership with community organizations. His team's work has been recognized nationally: Cleveland received StriveTogether's Cheryl Broadnax Award for Innovation and Results in 2024 for driving better and more equitable outcomes for students and families. The school is also a FranklinCovey Leader in Me Lighthouse School, reflecting its sustained focus on student leadership and aligned academic systems.

Clark earned his Ed.D. from Clemson University in 2023 and is an alumnus of the Call Me MiSTER program. He holds a B.S. in Elementary Education (History minor) from Morris College, plus an M.A. in Administration & Supervision and an Education Specialist (Ed.S.) degree from Furman University.



Julie Fowler
Superintendent, Spartanburg County School District 3

Julie Fowler is the superintendent of Spartanburg County School District Three, where she leads a cradle-to-career vision for student success across Cannons, Cowpens, and Pacolet Elementary Schools, Clifdale Middle, Gettys D. Broome High, and the Daniel Morgan Technology Center. She was selected to lead District Three in 2023 and is the district's current superintendent.

With nearly four decades in education, Fowler previously served as deputy state superintendent for College & Career Readiness at the South Carolina Department of Education and as superintendent of Abbeville County School District, among other cabinet-level roles in Greenwood 51 and McCormick. She has also served the state education agency as a director and dispute-resolution officer.

Under her leadership, District Three is a core partner in a \$15 million Full-Service Community Schools initiative with Spartanburg Academic Movement and District Seven, expanding integrated academic, health, and family support for students. She also serves ex officio on the Daniel Morgan Technology Center governing board.

Fowler began her career as a special education teacher after earning her B.S. (1985) and M.Ed. (1988) from Winthrop University and later completed a Ph.D. at Clemson University. She served eight years on Winthrop's Board of Trustees, chairing the presidential search that selected the university's 12th president.



Randall Gary
Superintendent, Spartanburg County School District 5

Randall Gary is superintendent of Spartanburg County School District Five, where he leads a 14-school, PreK–12 district serving the Duncan–Lyman–Wellford–Reidville communities. His recent work includes major capital improvements—such as the new James F. Byrnes High School stadium complex—and districtwide strategic planning tied to "Bond 2025."

Gary became superintendent of District Five on July 1, 2019, after serving as superintendent of Lexington County School District Three from 2015 to 2019. Earlier, he was principal of Dent Middle School in Richland Two, where he was named South Carolina's Middle School Principal of the Year in 2010.

He serves on the University of South Carolina Upstate Foundation Board (elected in 2023) and is an active collaborator with regional partners advancing cradle-to-career outcomes for

students. A career educator with classroom, principal, and superintendent experience, Gary holds an Ed.D. and has a background in civil engineering technology.



Darryl Owings
Superintendent-in-Residence / K-12 Liaison,
Spartanburg Academic Movement

Darryl Owings serves as Superintendent-in-Residence and K-12 Liaison at the Spartanburg Academic Movement (SAM), where he strengthens partnerships with superintendents and school leaders across Spartanburg County. A founding board director of SAM, he stepped down from the board to take on this role.

Before joining SAM, Owings led Spartanburg County School District Six for 21 years, retiring in 2023 after 31 years in the district and 36 years in public education; he was the district's second-longest-serving superintendent. The board appointed Ken Kiser to succeed him later that year.

An educator and leader rooted in the community, Owings previously served as principal of Dorman High School and Gable Middle School and began his career teaching at Spartanburg High School. He holds an Ed.D. and a master's degree from the University of South Carolina and a B.A. from Newberry College, where he was inducted into the Newberry Athletics Hall of Fame in 2009.

Among his signature initiatives as superintendent, Owings championed District Six's Farm-to-School program—recognized with Upstate Forever's 2018 Tommy Wyche Land Conservation Champion Award—and helped build a districtwide culture of health and nutrition. The district also established the Darryl F. Owings "Make a Difference" Scholarship Fund in his honor.

Savannah Ray serves as the Director of Center for Youth Engagement and Partnerships, leading SAM's Out-of-School Time Collaborative and the Youth Philanthropy Board.

A native of Spartanburg County, Savannah works to broaden active relationships with organizations across the county's diverse nonprofit, faith, and business sectors, willing to align their actions in support of children across Spartanburg County. Savannah was previously

employed with the Girl Scouts of South Carolina - Mountains to Midlands, leading outreach teams.

Savannah earned her Master of Public Administration from the University of Georgia and Bachelor of Arts in Communications Studies from Furman University.



Julie Denesha Manager, Workforce & Pipeline Development, Spartanburg Regional Healthcare System

Julie Denesha is a passionate healthcare leader, educator, and vibrant workforce strategist dedicated to building equitable and sustainable career pathways in healthcare.

As Manager of Workforce Development at Spartanburg Regional Healthcare System (SRHS), she leads initiatives that connect education, community, and healthcare to cultivate the next generation of professionals.

Julie holds a Master of Science in Nursing Education from Chamberlain College of Nursing and a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration from the University of South Carolina–Spartanburg. This combination of clinical and business education enables her to bridge clinical expertise with strategic leadership and systems thinking, fostering collaboration and promoting teamwork across disciplines to drive meaningful results.

Her career spans nursing education, student services, and organizational development, giving her a unique perspective on aligning talent development with both organizational and community needs. As an educator, she has learned to inspire, guide, and empower others to grow skills that also define her leadership approach.

Among her signature initiatives is Career Immersion Days—an interactive, small-group experience that introduces students to healthcare careers in a meaningful, engaging way. These events provide an innovative alternative to traditional shadowing and help SRHS reach a broader and more diverse pipeline of future talent. Her work is deeply collaborative, involving partnerships with local schools, colleges, and organizations such as OneSpartanburg Inc. and the Spartanburg Academic Movement.



Bennie L. Harris is Chancellor of the University of South Carolina Upstate, where he helps provide uniquely transformative opportunities for students, staff, faculty, and the community to experience possibilities and fulfill their dreams.

Chancellor Harris received a Bachelor of Science degree in industrial engineering from Mississippi State University, a Master of Business Administration in strategic marketing from Washington State University, and a doctorate in strategic educational marketing from the University of Alabama at Birmingham.

He went on to serve in increasingly crucial roles at Washington State University, the University of Alabama at Birmingham, DePaul University, Lipscomb University, and at Morehouse School of Medicine, where he was Senior Vice President for Institutional Advancement from 2014 until his appointment at USC Upstate in 2021.

Allen Smith was born and raised in Greenville, NC. After graduating from East Carolina University with a Bachelors of Science in Political Science, Smith was appointed to serve as Town Clerk for the Town of Bethel, NC. After working in local government for a couple years, Smith was hired as Vice President of Operations for the Greenville-Pitt County Chamber of Commerce. He was then

promoted to Senior Vice President. In 2010, Smith was hired as the President/CEO of the Greater Greer Chamber of Commerce. With the support of a professional staff and devoted volunteer leadership, the Chamber grew financially and in overall membership growth. On June 16, 2014, Smith was named the President/CEO of the Spartanburg Area Chamber of Commerce – the only organization in South Carolina in which the chamber, economic development and tourism entities co-exist under one umbrella. In January 2017, the Chamber, through the leadership of a 52 member steering committee, launched a five-year, comprehensive community and economic development strategy entitled "OneSpartanburg". The \$4.5 million effort has enhanced, augmented and accelerated much of the

transformative work currently underway in the Spartanburg community. In September 2020, the Spartanburg Area Chamber of Commerce launched a rebrand to represent its collective and strategic plan. Allen is now the President/CEO of OneSpartanburg, Inc. OneSpartanburg, Inc. 's mission is to build a vibrant Spartanburg through business, economic and tourism development. Whether you're looking for business resources, economic expertise, community leadership or tourism information, OneSpartanburg, Inc. is where you'll find it.

Given Spartanburg's recent accolades as a statewide leader in education, healthcare, culture and economic development, Smith, his wife Jenni, and their two daughters, Eloise, and Mary Barrett are excited about what's to come and are incredibly proud to call Spartanburg home.

Taylor's expertise spans public health areas like reproductive health, mental health, substance use prevention, and high school dropout prevention. She advocates for amplifying

communities across the U.S. to develop cradle-to-career systems of opportunity. He presides over many of EdRedesign's signature talent development offerings, including the EdRedesign Fellowship for Cradle-to-Career Partnership Leaders, Summer Institute for Neighborhood Leaders, By All Means Senior Fellows Program, and By All Means Communities of Practice initiative.

His work has focused on themes of civic engagement, community development, and educational equity in the U.S., Latin America, and Africa. Accelerator (PSA), a place-based service year collaborative that aims to attract and retain local talent to pursue social impact careers in the Mid-Hudson Valley region of New York State.

In January 2024, Rob was selected as a Presidential Leadership Scholar. Rob is a member of the Board of Directors of the Children's Funding Project, a former World Economic Forum Global Shaper, and a former Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation Millennium Scholar. In January 2025, Rob joined the StriveTogether Board of Directors. He holds a B.A. from Harvard College, an Ed.M in Education Policy and Management from the Harvard Graduate School of Education, and a Mid-career Master's in Public Administration (MPA) from Harvard Kennedy School.
